

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YOUR WORKSHOP

What is a Portrait?

It is an image of a particular person. (A "Figure" on the other hand, is an image of a body, generic, not particular.) A portrait can be a photograph. If a work of fine art, it is by the hand of an artist.

The sine qua non of a portrait is that it resemble a particular person; this is called "getting a likeness." How to "get a likeness" is the subject of this workshop. It is not necessary to draw accurately or in detail to get a likeness. It is the skill of noticing the characteristics and impact of the subject, and interpreting them, representing the impact the subject has on the artist. What is unique and interesting about this person? How do I feel about this person? How can I show that? This is what we will be talking about and practicing together.

Materials:

Drawing paper, such as Canson Mi-Teintes, in middle value gray &/or colors

Soft vine or willow charcoal

White chalk, pastel, charcoal pencil, or conte'

Kneaded eraser

(We will not work in color. This is not about how to use a medium. We will use the artists' most basic tool: drawing.)
